executive report

National Chairman

A 70 YEAR JOURNEY

It's 70 years since one man, at the end of the Second World War, went to one city and planted our first CRC church. Today, CRC Churches International is organisationally in 14 countries and has an ongoing ministry presence in a further 36 nations of our world; and I estimate that we have around 1,000 churches and outreaches stretching across the world.

I came to Christ under Leo Harris' ministry, as a 17 year old, and have been serving Jesus ever since through our CRC denominational family. It's been an amazing privilege to be leading the Christian Family Centre since 1978 and our CRC Movement here in Australia since 2002 and it's an honour that I never take for granted.

We are to love our Movement and be loyal to it without being pridefully sectarian, for we must never forget that the kingdom of God on earth has tens of thousands of denominational families like ours. So many of our CRC members, who are ministering in the nations, are doing this through other Christian organisations; and they serve with our blessing and they remain loyal and committed to our CRC vision, values and strategic directions.

DIFFERENT WORLD... SAME WORD

Though our **world** has radically changed from 1945, fellow Pastors and Leaders and Church Members, it is the same **Word** that we proclaim; and that Word centres around the person of Jesus Christ and the good news about the gospel of God's grace that He both proclaimed and demonstrated through His life, death and resurrection. I still get quite overwhelmed that our Heavenly Father has called us to outwork the ongoing ministry of the resurrected Christ through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit.

This year's National Pastors & Leaders Conference we have entitled, **WIN!** because we need to get constantly reenergised and empowered to reach our lost world for Jesus Christ. We are being challenged to run this race with both Godly discipline and spiritual purpose to be able to win people to Christ and plant Christ-centred churches.

Several years ago I shared an important Conference message about the **Cause, Community and Corporate** dimensions of Kingdom life and how we tend to personally lean towards one of these; and yet each is important as we outwork the ministry of Christ in our local churches and in our Movement. The Corporate dimension doesn't excite us much, but it's so important because we must respond to the rapid changes that are occurring in our world. For example, who would have thought ten years ago that our Federal Parliament is seriously considering changing the Marriage Act to allow same sex couples to also marry. I have communicated to our National Council twice over the past six months on this issue. Governments now also require churches and denominations to adhere to a stack of new laws and regulations that has led to significant changes in the way we conduct our ministry.

This is why, at this year's official Council Meeting, we need the endorsement from our members to amend our **National Constitution**. We have been foreshadowing these important organisational changes over the past couple of years and we have received extensive comments from many pastors.

Last year we ratified our new **Duty of Care and Child Protection Guidelines** that each local church needs to facilitate within the legal framework of their State/Territory. At this year's Council Meeting we need to expand this provision for all ordained CRC Ministers. The CRC has to move forward in its processes in view of what the *Royal Commission into Sexual Abuse by Institutions* is uncovering

and the advice we are receiving about how movements, organised like ourselves, need to adapt.

The CRC as an ordaining body at both National and State level has to now ensure that **every Minister follows certain protocols** and has the requisite training, over and above what our churches do in outworking the accepted CRC Duty of Care guidelines. This is going to require a significant administrative role from our National Office to ensure that we follow what the law and our insurers require.

STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS

Leadership and ministry development is the engine room of our movement and, therefore, we are restructuring our **National Training Team** under Pastor Chris Carmody's direction. Chris, along with a revamped and expanded team that now includes Pastor Nathan Bettcher (our previous National Administrator), will be outworking some innovations that will greatly increase the scope of ministry training across the CRC.

At this year's conference, we are again highlighting the **Colombo Project** (Sri Lanka) that we launched in 2010, as we've made the decision to borrow funds, in the short term, to complete the project over the next 18 months. We are borrowing from our generations funds in South Australia and Victoria and these funds will be repaid by the supporting churches who are already giving towards this important

National project. We also need other churches and individuals to contribute so these borrowed funds can be paid back over the next few years.

The other National project concerns **Walhalla** (USA) which several churches have been supporting. We are so thankful that Adelaide Christian Centre, under Pastor Mike Groom, is taking oversight of this on our behalf and is doing the heavy financial lifting. However, we still need churches to support the development of this important church and Missionary Training Centre as a base to reach into the Americas (particularly Central & South America).

Everything we do in the corporate dimension organisationally and with these Movement-wide projects helps us outwork our **Great Commission cause** and it also builds **relational community** between our churches and amongst our ministers.

As we've stated in our **National Strategic Directions** (2013-2018), we are looking for the Holy Spirit to empower us in our evangelistic efforts, to help us plant many new churches and to keep motivating us to reach out to our increasingly secular Australian society and into the nations of our world. I am believing that this year's WIN! Conference will propel us over the next 12 months to do this more effectively.

The National Chairmen of our CRC nations, along with our International Missions Strategic Team, and with the endorsement of our Australian National Executive are releasing, at this Conference, our **International Strategic Directions** for the next five years, 2015-2020. As each nation practically outworks this new International Statement, this will provide another stepping stone to realising our vision of having **a ministry presence in every nation of our world by our 100th birthday in 2045**.

A big thank you for your faithful and loyal support as we work together in love and unity to accomplish this vision that God has given to us.

Please keep our National Executive and the various Strategic Teams in your prayers as we endeavour to serve the best interest of our great Movement.

Victoria

A very inspiring time was held with our State Conference this year. The theme was TriggerPoint with the idea that something initiates our actions and galvanizes a commitment that changes everything. It has been a pleasing year looking towards the future. Church plants have been initiated at Lilydale and Wentworth and are going well. A new Affiliated Credential was also recommended for Mildura. Likewise we have seen three Trainee Credentials graduate to Minister, and a Minister recognised for National Credentials.

NSW / ACT / QLD

What I love about being part of the CRC Churches International family in NSW/ACT/QLD is the strong level of connectedness between our churches and pastors, balanced with a healthy Kingdom-mindedness that has been expressed in the heart of our CRC Charter from the early days of our movement.

In our own church at Narrandera we often say, “Together with the wider church community we pastor 5000”. There is an openness to what God is doing in the wider Body of Christ, partnered with a loyal sense of belonging that allows us to celebrate the strength and benefit of being part of a family of churches, whilst keeping focus on reaching communities and nations with the Good News.

Across the churches in our State we are experiencing an exciting rising tide of supernatural transformation and healing in the lives of people within our churches and communities. Our State conferences over recent years have helped foster this, from Philip Mantosa in Albury in 2013, to the amazing evangelism and ministry stories from our own pastors in Griffith in 2014. Also our most recent conference in Orange was an inspiring time with Daniel Hagen, where there was an amazing sense of liberty and expectancy, expressed in extended times of worship, the Gifts of the Spirit and healing and a heartfelt responsiveness to the preached Word.

As I move around in wider circles, I can't help but feel encouraged by the integrity and spiritual passion that is evident amongst our own churches and pastors including an incredibly gifted and passionate emerging generation of men and women. The common feedback from our various State camps and programs for children, youth and young adults is the strong sense of calling amongst our younger generations. They are expressing a desire and willingness to give their life to significant and sacrificial ministry, again with a focus on supernatural evangelism, church planting and world missions. Our State Children's and Youth leaders, Caroline Dennis and Jodie Elliott are challenging our State Executive team to take this seriously and not miss the opportunity to provide clear pathways for training and ministry opportunity for these devoted young people.

Over the last year our State Executive team have been purposefully inviting younger leaders to our Executive meetings to gain the input of a wider cross section of our pastors and leaders. Equally inspiring, though, is those pastors and leaders amongst us who, after decades of ministry and loyal service in our churches and beyond, remain passionate to use their Ministry Gifting and experience to continue being fruitful for the Kingdom.

One example of this is Dr Barry Chant and his wife, Vanessa, who have committed significant time and energy over the past few years to organise regular well attended regional pastors' meetings in our Sydney area. These regional gatherings have provided opportunity for a growing connection with pastors and churches who are seeking relationship and possible affiliation with the CRC. Our relational style and autonomous but interdependent structure combined with a contemporary, Word-based, Spirit-filled ministry expression allows us to offer a viable option for connection and support to independent churches and ministries that are increasingly finding the benefit of belonging. We are very much enjoying these new relationships.

Across NSW/ACT/QLD we have a significant number of students completing various levels of ministry training with our excellent CRC College of Ministry and other training providers including Vision, Tabor, Set Free Ministries and Bethel School of Supernatural Ministry. We also have approximately thirty pastors on some level of credentialing pathway working towards a Trainee, State Ministers or National Ministers credential.

I am constantly grateful for our State Executive team, whose servant hearts and spiritual leadership make it an absolute pleasure and privilege to lead the CRC in NSW/ACT/QLD. Thanks to Cheryl Moon (State Secretary), Sam Morey (State Treasurer), Jan Bollington (Secretary - Training and Credentialing), Ian Miller (Vice Chairman), Dave Wright (Church Planting), Ralph Martin (Credentialing), Rod Bortolin (Training), Caroline Dennis (Children's Ministry) and Jodie Elliott (Youth).

There is much to be thankful to God for as we believe together for even greater fruit for the Kingdom in these exciting times.

GROWING MOMENTUM

There's been a growing momentum across our movement in SA, WA and NT of recent years, as demonstrated by the stronger numbers at conferences and also the number of new and developing pastors that have been ordained at each of our recent State conferences. Further, a number of church plants have commenced. This year eighteen people were ordained! It was also the first time for many years at our State Conference that we had representation of all three of our states, with the furthest churches represented being from Pt Hedland in WA and Ti Tree in the NT.

STATE CRC CONFERENCE: EQUIP

Over recent years we have been encouraging younger members of our State Council to help facilitate our events, and it's great that this year's conference was again largely developed by the input of Pr Josh O'Callaghan from Murray Bridge CFC. Our key note speaker was Karl Faase, an exceptional communicator, who shared around the challenge of speaking into our culture. His messages were based on his 'Toward Belief' DVD series, which addressed the importance of dealing with the belief blockers in our world. The hospitality of the Stirling church was appreciated.

TWO STALWARTS RETIRE!

Pr Neil Milne and Pr John Poyzer were both honoured at the Conference with their retirement from the State Executive and as our previous Vice Chairmen.

John will continue on as a State Minister this year, sharing that responsibility now with the newly appointed Pr Mike Russell.

Neil will continue on with involvement with missions, overseeing specifically the Colombo Project.

STATE EXECUTIVE TEAM & MINISTRIES

A new State Executive Team was appointed at this conference for 2015-17. I was endorsed for my 10th two-year term as State Chairman. Pr Josh O'Callaghan became the new State Vice Chairman, representing a generational shift from Prs John Poyzer and Neil Milne.

Pr Greg Crome continues a special concern for Western Australia as does Pr Bill Vasilakis Christian Family Centre churches and outreaches in Central Australia. In addition to Josh's appointment, the changing of the guard comes with the appointment of Pr Kevin Hall from the PortLife church. Further, Pr Fiona Voortman continues her role on the Credentialing team and with the National Church Health portfolio. Pr Paul Kidney continues to lead faithfully the Northern region, as well as leading an outstanding church in Port Lincoln. Pr Joe Habermehl likewise continues on the team, even though he is very busy due to the church's consistent growth and the planting of an extension campus at Salisbury. Pr David Washington remains as our State Secretary and we thank him for his tireless work and eye for detail.

Pr David Bland is ceasing as the CRC College Dean, taking over The Hills Christian Family Centre church from Pr David Smythe, who is retiring. Pr Nathan Bettcher our former National Administrator will be taking over this role.

AROUND THE CHURCHES

The church at Metro East closed and our Woodside Community Church left the movement during the last year. The CRC church at Nairne changed leadership from Pr Jim Varsos to Pr Mike Stoodley. At Port Hedland, Pr Mike O’Reilly was formalised in the leadership of that church. Pr Chris Walsingham has been inducted as the new pastor of the Seaview church, with the retirement of Pr Con Keros from the senior role there.

The Stirling church has begun services in Mount Barker with Pr Derek Croser giving leadership assisted by Pr Steve Sherman to this new outreach service. Pr Mark White from the Clare New Life Church will be taking up the leadership of the Mt Compass church.

NATIONAL STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS

The SA/NT/WA State team continues to proactively outwork the goals as set within our Movement’s 2013-2018 Strategic Directions document. Sarah Wilson from PortLife Church

leads the State Children’s team and Pr Mark Bettcher has now finished up as State Youth Director. Pr Kevin Hall, also from PortLife Church, will be taking over this role, facilitating a team to arrange State rallies and leader’s events

FURTHER STATE EVENTS 2015

An Administrators and Secretaries day has been planned in September. Specific training and resources will be shared so that each can learn from the other in the administrative area.

A Spiritual Formation Retreat which Prs Joe Habermehl and Hans Voortman are facilitating is also scheduled later in 2015.

CONCLUSION

It remains my privilege to represent our State on the National Executive. A great National team continues to set Strategic Directions for the Movement. Working with our National Chairman Pr Bill Vasilakis and other State Chairmen and National leaders has been such an honour. ‘Iron sharpens iron’ and in that context it’s been a really exciting and vibrant team to be part of. Peter Gillard is to be thanked for his tireless work as National Administrator and in his work maintaining great cohesiveness to all we do as a National Movement.

International Missions

What an interesting, exciting and challenging year in the nations of our world. God is doing some amazing things. Some of these are happening quietly and not widely known and others more public, but each have the seal of God's hand on them.

I have observed so many times that even in the midst of great conflicts, civil wars, national disasters, oppositions and difficult times God is at work. We sometimes think that God needs a conducive and pleasant environment in which to do his work, but this is not so. It's simply amazing the number of people who have been saved, healed and experienced the miraculous side of God right in the midst of adverse conditions.

From the reports from our different churches and leaders, there have been some amazing things taking place in the nations.

In this past year there have been ministry visits by Pastors and leaders to many nations including several parts of Europe and Africa, spanning from the east to the west. Some of these significant ministry trips have gone into Scotland, China,

Sri Lanka, India, Nepal, Myanmar, Philippines, Cambodia, Vietnam, New Zealand, USA, Peru, Mexico, Papua New Guinea, Indonesia, and the Pacific islands of the Solomon's, Vanuatu and Fiji. There have also been many other less significant but still vitally important ministry expressions in this last year.

The South Pacific games hosted by Papua New Guinea was a great opportunity for open-air evangelism and Bethel Church gave out 20,000 tracts and led 300 people from different nations to make first time decisions for Christ.

The International Jamboree hosted in the Solomon Islands was another great gathering of youth with teams from New Zealand, several Australian churches, Papua New Guinea and Vanuatu.

A large number of young people made serious commitments to serve Christ in their nation and go out and present the Gospel.

In The Philippines there has been for the past year or more a 'ground swell' of passion and fervor to preach the Gospel among the youth and to go out and plant churches.

There are places in the Solomon Islands and also Papua New Guinea where this same fervor to go out and preach the Gospel is also taking place amongst the younger generation (both men and women).

I am not directly aware of what might be taking place in Africa and Europe but India and Myanmar are also seeing this passion to preach the Gospel on the streets of their cities, towns and villages, reaching the sinner regardless of their background and particular identity.

Some of this younger generation, are experiencing some amazing healings, through the ministry, along with many instances of deliverance from demonic possession.

What a blessing to have some part along with many others in these youth in the nations.

There are some hard locations experiencing opposition and persecution at different levels of intensity, and all who are actively engaged in preaching the Gospel have experienced spiritual conflict/warfare. There is no level playing field in the arena of proclaiming the Gospel but we are both forewarned and forearmed with our God-given armor and weapons.

This is why we need to undergird all our efforts in our work of proclaiming the Gospel with concerted prayer. Let's all continue to acknowledge, uphold, and support our missionaries in their respective fields of service, such as Graeme and Moya Enright serving in the most distant of our mission fields and the great work they have done in Walhalla, South Carolina, USA.

Finally I would like to share something that has taken my attention recently concerning what Jesus spoke to his disciples about becoming 'fishers of men'.

Matthew 4:19 And he saith unto them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." (KJV)

Doors of Opportunity

The vision of a presence in every nation by 2045 is being rigorously pursued. The International Strategic Directions for 2015-2020 have been finalised and will continue to give a focus to the forward movement of CRC Churches International.

There are unlimited opportunities around the world, particularly in developing nations, for Australians to fully present the gospel by word and deed, by the power of signs and wonders (Romans 15:18, 19). In many nations sound basic teaching, like CRC has been founded on, is greatly needed.

Tony Smits online Bible School being promoted by Ps Ian Traill has students in 35 nations. Some of these churches are now wanting to become CRC Churches. As Ps Ian has developed relationships and checked integrity over a number of years, there are presently strong positive opportunities in countries like Ghana, Uganda and Pakistan. CRC Churches in Australia have been invited to become a part with the Transformation Alliance from Singapore, to bring social, spiritual, and financial transformation to Timor Leste.

Pastor Phil and Norma Cayzer have recently visited Uganda and working with Ps Mike Tyrrell have a large number of churches wanting to be part of CRC. The process of adding value to them with sound teaching and progressing on the pathway of building relationships is now starting.

Ps Mark Walker has continued to minister in South America and explore opportunities for CRC ministry involvement, particularly in Bolivia.

Other pastors are taking the opportunity to explore new nations.

Movement Projects

Colombo Project-The Colombo project is now moving forward with clear positive action. Contracts have been signed, a foundation stone has been laid, and the site dedicated to the Lord. The construction company has taken over the site and building preparation is underway. We are greatly appreciative of Ps Neil Milne taking the lead in co-ordinating the project on behalf of the National Executive.

Walhalla USA-Pastor Graeme and Moya Enright have continued to make a great contribution to this church. They will complete their time there by mid-2016. A new senior minister is now being sought for the church. In the meantime, missionary opportunities into Mexico are being explored as a start to fulfilling the vision of

the missionary mandate of this church. We greatly appreciate the vision and contribution of Ps Mike Groom and the Adelaide assembly in this project on behalf of the National Executive.

Nathan Poloso Medical Expenses-We deeply appreciate the continuing contributions that are being given to reduce the debt in the missions account for Nathan's medical treatment.

[Cyclone Pam, Vanuatu](#)

When Cyclone Pam struck Vanuatu in March 2015, immense damage was done in the nation. An appeal was made to our CRC Churches and support came from New Zealand and Papua New Guinea, as well as a total of over \$43,000 from Australian CRC Churches. Working with Ps Remy Adams, the Vanuatu National Leader, Ps Greg Crome field supporter, and Ps Bill Brill from Nelson Bay have helped in making a valuable contribution to the rebuilding of homes, church facilities and other necessities. By working in cooperation with Ps Steve Blake of Liberty for the Nations, we have been able to accomplish far more than would have been possible on our own. Not only has there been practical help to the people of Vanuatu, but also spiritual help.

A city wide miracle crusade was conducted at the beginning of September. Over 5 nights 40% of the city were involved. All denominations were involved and everyone was excited about Jesus. On the last night with a crowd of 10,000 people, over 5,000 responded to the Gospel. Stunning miracles followed: deaf ears hearing, blind eyes seeing, lame walking. Will Vanuatu ever be the same?

Portlife Church has raised \$280,000 so far for building a children's home in Mandalay, Myanmar. The first stage was opened in June this year.

Kingston City Church has raised \$240,000 for building a new church facility in Suva, Fiji. Building teams have gone to Fiji and worked with nationals to complete this fantastic new facility.

The vision, faith and action on the part of the Portlife and Kingston City Churches with these projects is outstanding. Congratulations to Ps Josh Poyzer and Ps Danny Parker and their respective churches on these achievements.

Australian CRC Churches have again reported giving almost \$2,000,000 to global missions in the past year. As some churches did not supply figures the actual total giving would be over \$2,000,000. Of this, 30% is given through the CRC missions office, 21% is given direct to CRC fields, and 49% given to partner fields (non CRC). The money given through CRC Missions office was \$866,726, an increase of 3% on the previous year.

The drop in value of the Australian dollar has put a very significant challenge to our funding in most nations. In most cases we need a 30% increase in giving to maintain existing levels of support.

[Short Term Mission Teams](#)

The long term success of short term mission teams is very closely linked to the amount of training done to prepare the team to go, and the debriefing after the trip.

The CRC Missions Guideline on Short Term Mission Teams outlines many of the legal and moral responsibilities a church has in sending a mission team.

The Missions office also has good training material available to prepare short term teams for a successful mission's experience.

Field Supporters

In order to more accurately reflect the role of our Field Facilitators, the IMST (international Missions Strategic Team) decided to change the name to Field Supporters. The concept being that the role is to be supportive to the national leaders and not to be directive or controlling in any way. CRC Missions Policy 2.1 has been accordingly updated.

Thank you

In the past year we have had 2 changes in the Australian Missions Office team.

Judi Shirley, who very efficiently handled our finances resigned from that role at the end of 2014. This role was then taken up, in a very smooth transition, by Kelly Groom. We very much appreciate the 8 years that Judi served in this role and the valuable contribution she made.

Kelly in taking up the finance assistant role is doing an excellent job and I want to express my thanks and appreciation to her.

We also had a change in the Editor of Pulse Magazine. Katelyn Fowler did a great job getting Pulse established as a regular CRC Missions publication. Now the role has been taken up by Mikaela Groom. Again, we are very appreciative of Mikaela stepping into this, and with her personal passion for global missions, as well as her skills in writing and graphics, she is making an excellent contribution.

Furthermore, I wish to thank Melanie Williams and the office team at South Eastern Christian Centre for their willing secretarial assistance.

I also wish to thank the members of IMST, Ps Barry Silverback, Ps Bill Vasilakis, Ps Neil Milne, Ps Mike Groom, Ps Bruce Sharman and myself, for their experience and wisdom being contributed to CRC Missions.

Strategic Report

The 2013 – 2018 CRC Strategic Directions have now been in effect for 24 months, and we are starting to see progress in all of the key areas. Continue to pray for the champions of each of these nine areas as they lead, drive and facilitate change on behalf of our Movement.

SPIRIT-POWERED EVANGELISM

Pr Ian Miller has compiled a list of CRC evangelists, and he is working, with his team, towards a number of goals. Initially the aim is to facilitate communication and cross-pollination of ideas amongst this group of evangelists through meeting together and utilising an online forum as a part of the CRC website.

DEVELOPING CHURCHES

Lead Pastors of our CRC churches with a church family size of over 400 have been meeting for a number of years. Pr Bill Vasilakis has now instigated similar meetings for Lead Pastors of 200+ and 100+ churches, with the purpose of developing their leadership skills set to enable them to healthily grow their church to the next level. The 200+ team met at Seaton in November 2014 and the 100+ team at Narrandera in June 2015. These groups of Lead Pastors will continue to gather annually.

Peter Gillard is liaising with the National Church Life Survey team regarding the 2016 survey. We aim to have a participation rate of over 80% by CRC churches in this survey, providing useful information not just for each individual church involved, but also for our whole Movement to assist with forward planning.

CONNECTING MINISTERS

Pr Bruce Sharman has developed a model to foster the connectedness between ministers within our CRC denominational family at a regional level in every State, and has a great team of people through our State Executive to outwork this goal.

REACHING NATIONS

We have seen a steady increase in activity, led by Pr Mike Cronin and Pr Barry Silverback. New resources are being provided to support churches in sending people for either short term or longer missions trips overseas. It has also been great to see many CRC churches ‘adopting’ nations; finding out about and praying for a nation with a view to God opening up a future opportunity there.

The new International Strategic Directions 2016 – 2021 will be launched at the 2015 National Conference.

TRAINING PEOPLE

We are grateful to Pr Rob Nyhuis for his leadership in this area for many years. Pr Chris Carmody has now taken on the mantle of leading CRC Training and has some great ideas that he and his team will implement in the coming year. The new Advanced Diploma of Youth Ministry will be launched at the 2015 National Conference, and this is a most significant new development that will have a huge impact.

We have ordained 22 new CRC Ministers into our Movement in the last 12 months.

REPRODUCING CHURCHES

Toolshed Church Planting Training events, under the leadership of Pr David Wright and his team, continue to draw good numbers of potential planters. With guest speakers such as Pr Barry Silverback and Pr Tony Smits the participants are receiving gems of wisdom that will hold them in good stead for any future endeavours.

David is also started increasing the online presence of CRC Church Planting, utilising the CRC website, with more information, stories and resources being uploaded. He is also facilitating an online Church Planters forum to share stories, ideas and strategies.

SHAPING GENERATIONS – YOUTH

Pr Tim Lochens and his Australian Youth team are planning to run Reload in 2017 as part of our International Peoples Convention. For our Pastors and Leaders National Conference in 2015 and 2016, the Youth Leaders stream will operate and this year's special guest will be Dan Lian. A new CRC Youth website is in development, which will improve communication across the wide expanses of our country. Tim plans to set up a dedicated CRC Young Adults team to support and resource our churches in this area of ministry.

SHAPING GENERATIONS – CHILDREN

Pr Caroline Dennis has developed a great team across Australia, supporting her in leading and resourcing Children's leaders in our Australian churches. Many will meet at the 2015 National Conference in the Children's Leaders stream, with guest speaker Roselyn Owen.

Caroline has travelled to and spoken at CRC Children's leaders events across Australia.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

A number of churches are in the early stages of setting up new CRC Christian schools across our nation.

As National Administrator I continue to support the National Executive team and the Strategic Area leaders by providing administrative support, and by compiling statistics in the form of measurable metrics that the Executive uses as one method of tracking progress towards fulfilment of our goals and strategies.

I look forward to continuing to work with leaders across our nation, at the National Executive level, in the States and in local churches, as together we work towards achieving our strategic plans and targets, and as a consequence extend the reach of God's Kingdom throughout Australia and the whole world.

Audit Report

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of CRC CHURCHES INTERNATIONAL AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED, which comprises the Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2015 and the Income and Expenses Report for the year then ended.

Committee's responsibility for the financial report

BASIS FOR QUALIFIED OPINION

Voluntary Revenue

Voluntary Revenue, such as Church Collections, and revenue from other fund raising activities can be a source of fundraising revenue. Our audit procedures with respect to voluntary revenue had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion with regard to voluntary revenue of the CRC CHURCHES INTERNATIONAL AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED.

AUDITOR'S OPINION

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of CRC CHURCHES INTERNATIONAL AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED as at 30 June 2015 and its financial performance for the year then ended and the requirements of the South Australian Act.

Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution

The financial report has been prepared to assist CRC CHURCHES INTERNATIONAL AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED to meet the requirements of the South Australian Act. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.
