executive report

A CHANGING WORLD

Australia is changing at break-neck speed. Sometimes churches can be the last to recognise what's occurring around them, and are often ill-prepared to adapt and change to better reach people with the message of Jesus.

Last year I wrote to you about the push to change the Marriage Act, allowing same-sex couples to also marry. This idea was almost inconceivable several years ago with most political parties and mainstream social groups endorsing the traditional view of marriage. Over the past 12 months we have seen how deep and wide is the secular push in our society with two examples being the new belief of gender fluidity and the furore that the Safe Schools initiative is having across our country.

I, along with other denominational Christian leaders, are gearing up to defend the traditional time-tested basis of marriage if the plebiscite goes ahead early next year. We won't despair or react even if the plebiscite is lost, but will adapt to this new reality, responding in a most loving and respectful way to all people without compromising our historic Christian beliefs.

THE ONLY ANSWER

This is just one of a host of social issues our nation is facing and I have been prayerfully reflecting about our role as a Christian Movement. It has become obvious

to me that our nation needs a genuine Christian awakening and that the long-term answer to all of these social, moral and ethical questions the nation is battling with is the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We need 5 million new born-again, Spirit-filled Christians and another 10,000 churches that are Biblically-based, Christ-centred, Holy Spirit-dependant, people-loving and culturally relevant. If these churches are contemporary, ministry focussed and engaging with their local communities, I doubt whether these terribly divisive issues would be gaining legitimacy.

WORLD WIDE REVIVAL

I've just come back from Africa and, because so many African nations are experiencing revival with the majority of their people being full-on Christians, these issues don't even get an airing. In fact, new Christian movements like Lighthouse Chapel International and the Church of Pentecost (both originating in Ghana) and the Redeemer Christian Church of God in Nigeria (just to name three), are reaching into the first-world nations of Europe and the Americas, planting hundreds of evangelistic, outreach-oriented churches to help turn the tide of the West's downward spiritual spiral.

THE CRC'S PRIMARY ROLE

Fellow pastors and leaders, I don't want the CRC to be reactive to these negatives, but to devote its energies to being part of the answer by evangelising

our local communities and planting churches across the breadth and length of our great nation. The church is the only hope for Australia because it stewards the Gospel which is the answer for individuals, our immediate communities and the nation as a whole.

The theme of our 2016 Conference is **Mission: Possible** and I believe we can double the number of CRC churches in Australia.

If every CRC Church and all of our pastors make the decision to seek God about this and expect that God will use them to raise up at least one church planter, then this is possible.

This would also require all of our churches (no matter what size) to pray, believe and give some financial support to plant a new church, either on their own or in cooperation with another church.

If every Evangelical and Pentecostal movement did likewise, we will start turning the tide of unbelief and the anti-Christian philosophical underpinnings that have emerged.

I am personally encouraged by what I have seen in Africa over the past six years, and in attending the **World Pentecostal Conference** in Sao Paulo, Brazil (the first time this triennial conference is being held in Latin America) I will be exposed to the amazing move of God that is taking place there.

WE'RE BETTER TOGETHER

Our Australian Strategic Directions 2013-2018 and the International Strategic Directions 2015-2020 launched at last year's conference, are helping us coordinate our collective efforts, both here in Australia and in the Nations. A rapid expansion of Jesus' Kingdom will occur as the CRC works cooperatively together.

We are not independent churches and ministers doing our own thing separate to one another. We are called

to work towards campaigning for a genuine Christian revival in our world through Spirit-empowered evangelism and apostolic church planting. This is the New Testament pattern that we are continually aligning to and is our reason for being as a Movement.

NEW TEAM MEMBERS

I'm delighted we can expand our National Executive team this year to include the portfolios of **Ministry Training** and **Church Planting** as these are the keys means to achieving this goal.

We're also seeing a linkage between **starting schools, community outreach** and **church planting**. I'm really pleased that Phil Cayzer, who is actually doing this in his own local context, can join our team to facilitate this right across our Movement.

Chris Carmody will also join our Executive as he is leading our National Training Team with fresh initiatives to better train our people for ministry.

I'm also thankful that our **Colombo Project** is coming together and for the churches that are liberally giving towards the establishment of this key base for Sri Lanka and the entire Indian Sub-continent.

APPRECIATION

A big thank you to our National Executive and the various strategic ministry teams working under their guidance, and for all of our State Executives who work closely together with us to serve the best interests of our Movement. It is a joy and privilege to serve you and to see the spiritual progress that is taking place in the CRC across the world.

A further effective State event was the **Trainee Pastors and Emerging Leaders Gathering** conducted in August with Pastors Ian Miller and Chris Carmody. Plans are afoot to revamp the **Elders and Boards Training Day** to bring 'in-house' training and discussion for our church's senior leadership.

PORTFOLIOS

David Bland handed over the coordination of **Training and Ministry College** towards the end of 2015 with Nathan Bettcher taking on this important role.

Kevin Hall is also being supported one day per week by the State in the State Youth Coordinator role and is working hard to particularly get alongside the youth leaders and to support the training and facilitating of youth teams.

Sarah Wilson is to be commended for all the work she does in conjunction with Caroline Dennis and the National Children's team.

Thanks to John Poyzer who continues to give coordination to the northern regions of our State as a State Minister, and to Mike Russell who coordinates the southern regions of our State and also to Greg Crome who continues to take a special concern for Western Australia.

AROUND THE CHURCHES

Three of our SA churches saw leadership change this year; The Hills Christian Family Centre with David Bland taking over from David Smythe; The Crossroads Church at Pt Augusta, with Manoj George moving back to Adelaide is being supported by our State Executive team; and with Mark White moving into the key role at The Overflow church at Mount Compass.

A unique situation exists too at the Macclesfield Uniting Church, where now two CRC pastors are facilitating the church. At the last conference we welcomed in Trevor Pugh as a new CRC minister coming in from the ACC movement to assist Darryl Stott in this church.

Three other significant milestones have or are occurring this year for churches in our movement.

The Adelaide Christian Centre Sturt Street celebrated its **70th anniversary** last year, the Christian Family Centre at Seaton celebrated its **40th anniversary** and the PortLife Church celebrated its **60th anniversary**. Congratulations go toward all of them and we thank God for His grace over these three significant churches in our Movement.

On a sad note, this last year has seen a number of wonderful pastors and pastors wives within our Movement pass on to be with the Lord. Early last year Pastors Pamela Birks and Ken Pedler passed away in May. Barbara Aiken and Maureen Yates, two outstanding partner wives went to be with Jesus. Our thoughts go out to all four of their families.

It remains my privilege to represent our States on the National Executive and I pray that the Lord strengthen and encourage our fellowship as we resolve afresh in the year ahead to build the community of faith that is the CRC family in our states.

“Courageous” was the theme of our State Conference. It was an excellent title to be the vehicle that carried the message of evangelism. Ben Fitzgerald was the timely young evangelist who we hosted, and he was definitely an inspiring example rather than just an exceptional communicator.

The rise and rise of evangelism in a new generation has been as welcome as it is breathtaking in its scope and potential. While we might expect the re-emergence of large events, the one on one ‘encounters’ will far outstrip the fruit of these campaigns except in as much as they re-energise people. A lot of this success we can put down to the ability of testimonies to be conveyed around the world by social media. The importance of this in the developing wave of outreach cannot be over stated. They are both encouraging and instructional. Viral is not an over statement; even fusion would not be an overstatement of the potential.

This is evidenced as more and more churches have confident street teams actively seeking a person envisaged in prayer or looking for what God may say or do for a person. This kind of evangelism employing prophetic and pastoral elements does not depend upon past relationships and opens new doors of opportunity. Such actions empower the Christian to interrupt the privacy of anyone. This was a very salient point of Ben Fitzgerald. Jesus was both a responder and an interrupter. For too long have we been too polite to interrupt people with Jesus.

Multiplying believers is echoed by multiplying churches. I can confirm that two churches planted during the latter part of the period in our last report in Lilydale and Wentworth are now established and two more are in the pipeline for Diggers Rest and one (and maybe two) City Suburban areas who have shared plans with me.

In ministry development, to meet current and ongoing opportunities, our students are enjoying the new CRC course format and are all doing very well. Likewise our children and youth leader training days are all feeding back the value of such quality input for dynamic ministries. As a result we have some exciting new trainees and potential trainees enjoying the power of the CRC collegiate.

Our regions are likewise continuing to develop their mutual support as a vital part of our leadership integrity. I happened to ring a pastor, who had come to our movement in later life with much experience, to touch base on how things were progressing. As part of the conversation he expressed to me that he had never previously experienced the amount of mutual support that he has seen in the CRC. This includes our women in ministry who meet each year. It is evident that where our ministers and leaders choose to connect together something very healthy is made possible.

We had an enjoyable and inspiring time at our State Conference in Sydney with almost every church from our three states represented and a high percentage of our credentialed Pastors in attendance. Our guest speaker Richie Seltzer from Canada was very well received and it was great to have his wife Chelsea with us also. Our conference theme "Advantage" emphasised the incredible gift the Holy Spirit is to us and the absolute advantage He brings to our life and ministry. During our Council meeting at Conference we were able to unanimously adopt a new and updated State Constitution which will enable some positive and helpful developments over the next few years. Jan already serves our State Executive team as Secretary-Training and Credentialing. Sincere thanks to our remaining Executive members Ian Miller (Vice Chairman/Supernatural Evangelism), Ralph Martin (Credentialing), and Rod Bortolin (Training). Thanks also to Caroline Dennis (Children's Ministry) and Jodie Elliott (Youth Ministry).

We have three functioning regions at present with Sydney Region very ably coordinated by Dr Barry Chant, Riverina Region led by Grant Redman, who only recently agreed to take on the coordinating role, and Central Coast region who successfully meet together without anyone admitting to being the coordinator at this stage.

The infamous Condo Youth Camp was again an inspirational and fruitful time with over 150 youth gathering together in the Central West town of Condobolin, NSW. The theme "Let's Do This" caused no small stir.

We have seen a few new church plants becoming more established this year and a number of new ministry credentials, with others moving through the process.

International Missions

I can recall the late Ps Leo Harris's words to me many times concerning why he felt that we must be engaged in Global Missions. It concerned the covenant that God made with Abraham to bless him and for Abraham and his seed to BE a blessing to all the nations on the earth. Ps Harris expressed that this was one of the most compelling reasons (second only to the Great Commission of Jesus) of WHY we as children of Abraham (through faith in Jesus Christ) are OBLIGATED to engage in missions to the nations. **We are obligated**; those words of Ps Harris had a profound affect on my life and continues to do so today.

Our mandate (obligation) is to carry out the mandate given to Abraham to bless all nations by proclaiming the good news of salvation, to every person, in every nation, through all generations. There is no greater vocation than the engaging of ourselves in making Christ's salvation known to as many people as possible, both at home, and in the nations near and far.

Over recent times we are witnessing and increasing interest and focus on the nations, in line with the CRC's 2045 vision to "having an ongoing ministry presence in every nation of the world by 2045 - our centenary". This is encouraging, and over the past 12 months there have been exploratory visits into new nations and expansion of existing ministries.

What's even more encouraging is watching our youth who are showing a keener interest and genuine concern for the nations and its people and are showing signs of wanting to engage in some way or another. What an opportunity we have to encourage, promote, and create pathways for them to give expression to explore the options open to them to make some change in their world.

There are amazing things being done by many people of all ages in the nations, but it's noticeable to witness the new wave of fervour and passion amongst the youth in the developing nations to engage in aggressive evangelism and the presentation of the Gospel with the view of bringing people to a saving knowledge of Christ. They are taking every opportunity, small or large, to travel and pursue contacts and anyone who shows interest in hearing more.

I am impressed as I have visited nations from India to Fiji to see this new preparedness to proclaim the Good News. They are not only bold but discreet in their approach and presentation adjusting to the differing environment and people they approach. I have not been to Africa in recent years but it seems that same thing is happening there also, and it's wonderful to see an organisational presence now in this continent. CRC Uganda is the first step into many other countries in this huge and varied continent.

Another amazing phenomena happening is the number of young women that are actively devoting themselves to serve Christ and openly engaging in one to one evangelism, prayer with healings, deliverance and miracles.

God is assembling His army, but it is not humanly and centrally managed; it is the work of God's Spirit. It is spontaneous, seemingly without any common pattern or modality, disconnected, fragile and misdirected, but it's none of those things. It's amazing because it's breaking out here and there with no obvious strategy, yet God is about HIS business and fully understands what He is doing.

Our vision may seem to be about nations, but it is really about people; reaching people, healing them, restoring them, equipping them, empowering them, and sending them.

'OUR' opportunities must be taken. These are the opportunities that have specifically been entrusted to us in the CRC to **grasp** and **carry out**. There are many

opportunities that are common to all of God's people **but there are some that specifically relate to OUR destiny** as a Movement that we need to be discerning and accepting of. God has pre-ordained a purpose and a pathway that we should walk in, **that He has prepared in advance for us to do. (Ephesians 2:10)**

The famous preacher Charles H Spurgeon said, *"I tremble as I think how poverty-stricken my life has been, compared with my opportunities."*

National Missions

Australian CRC Churches have again made steady progress this year toward fulfilling the International vision of “having an ongoing ministry presence in every nation of the world by 2045 - our centenary”. 29 years to go!

In 2015 there were 196 official nations in the world. Australian CRC Churches currently have some involvement in 68 of these nations. Of these 37 are visited regularly contributing effective ministry input. This would closely equate to “a presence in a nation” – an effective ongoing ministry focused on fulfilling Jesus’s Great Commission of making disciples.

The other 31 nations that Australian CRC Churches have some involvement in are at various stages working toward having a presence in that nation.

Table 1 shows the increase in nations involved over the past 4 years from 49 in 2012 to 69 in 2016 (41% increase), and of nations regularly visited from 35 in 2014 to 37 in 2016 (6% increase). The contributing investment of Pastors/Churches in Australia with Pastors/Churches in other nations, building beyond an occasional ministry trip, to developing relationship and making significant ministry investment so that many of these Pastors/Churches want to become part of CRC Churches International.

The ongoing investment of Ps Mark Walker in Bolivia has now seen the establishment of a new church of Quechua people in Sucre, which

is becoming a CRC church linked to South Eastern Christian Centre, Endeavour Hills.

Similarly in Brazil Ps Rodney Bortolin’s involvement over recent years now has a church becoming an Affiliate Church of CRC linked to LifeSource Church, Griffith.

Another group of 16 outreach churches in Cambodia are now in the process of becoming Affiliate churches with CRC in Cambodia linked to South Eastern Christian Centre, due to the investment by Ps Kevin Clark and myself.

An exciting development from Manningham Christian Centre is the expansion of the CRC church plant in Halifax, England (2014) led by Ps John and Catherine Warren who are now planting another church in the U.K. and developing a mission work into Moldova in Eastern Europe.

A highlight this year has been the official recognition of Uganda CRC as an Affiliate movement of CRC with a National Executive led by Ps Sunday Sula Lasa. Ps Phil Cayzer is the Field Supporter. This has been the result of the long term investment of a number of CRC Pastors in Uganda over about 15 years, including Ps John and Jean Leak, Ps Jim Hewitt, Ps Bill and Norma Osborne, Ps Jono Osborne, Ps Mike and Shirley Tyrrell and others. Many churches in Uganda are wanting to join with CRC Churches International. This is another doorway into the vast African continent with many needs and many opportunities for our ministry.

The ministry of Ps Ian Trill (based in China) promoting the Tony Smits Bible School online is opening increasing opportunities for CRC ministry in many nations, with people who have been receiving sound CRC teaching online.

A concerning issue is that the reported finance giving to missions by Australian CRC Churches has decreased over the last 2 years. In 2015 this was down 3% and in 2016 it was down 10%.

Ps Graeme and Moya Enright have now returned to Australia after investing four and a half years into the work in Walhalla, USA. They have made an invaluable contribution to revitalising and strengthening the work there.

The Colombo Project, which is a whole Movement project, is proceeding very well now under the capable coordination of Ps Neil Milne. It is anticipated to be finished in February 2017, with an official opening at the end of March 2017. This is an exciting step forward for the ministry in Sri Lanka.

The June 2016 issue of Pulse magazine highlighted seven newer nations where CRC Churches are being established. There were too many to fit into one edition so two more will be highlighted in the September issue. As well as this, the September issue will also feature some churches that are doing active ethnic ministries in Australia. Overall there are nine Australian CRC Churches conducting various ethnic services in Australia, and an additional three churches who are running various ethnic small groups. This ministry which may be known as Diaspora mission is taking up the incredible opportunity God has given us in Australia due to the

very diverse ethnic composition of the Australian population. This also creates many opportunities for ministry back into their home countries.

Thank you very much to everyone who has supported the ministry of CRC Missions over the past year. My special thanks to Kelly Groom who does an excellent job managing our finances, as well as to Mikaela Groom who is the Editor of Pulse Magazine, and Rachel Ashdown who is my part-time P.A.

Also thank you to the IMT members who continue to contribute their wisdom, vision and energies into CRC Missions. The team consists of myself, Ps Bill Vasilakis, Ps Neil Milne, Ps Bruce Sharman, Ps Barry Silverback, and newer, younger members about to join the team, Ps Jeremy Steel and Ps David Manning, together with Ps Ai Wari from PNG as an observer at present.

Strategic Report

The CRC in Australia is now half-way through the 2013 – 2018 CRC Strategic Directions timeline. Progress has continued in each of the nine strategic areas. There has also been a change of leadership in some of the keys areas, so uphold these champions in these areas as they facilitate the strategic development on behalf of our Movement.

Spirit-empowered Evangelism

Pr Ian Miller has continued to both lead and model this area. We are now encouraging 'Healing Clinics' as a part of all conference events. Ian and his team are working to connect and facilitate the cross-pollination of ideas between evangelists. They are also developing on-line video resources which will be posted onto the CRC website to support, encourage and train churches around Australia.

Developing Churches

Pr Bill Vasilakis has continued facilitating meetings for Lead Pastors of 400+, 200+ and 100+ churches, with the purpose of developing their leadership skills set to enable them to healthily grow their church to the next level, and these groups of Lead Pastors will continue to gather annually.

Peter Gillard continues to work with the National Church Life Survey team to organise the survey which will occur in October/November this year. He will analyse the results when they become available and report to the National and State Executive teams to help them with forward planning.

Connecting Ministers

Pr Bruce Sharman oversees this area. New Regional Fellowships have been developed in the Melbourne metropolitan area, and in NSW country.

Reaching Nations

It has been wonderful to see the building in Colombo rising as a result of the years of faithful giving by many of our churches and individuals to the Colombo Project.

It has also been terrific to see the activity of so many churches in countries across the world as we work together to achieve the 2045 vision of 'an ongoing ministry presence in every country of the world.'

Missions finances have been under pressure, and much thought and strategising has been done of ways to not just deal with the current problems, but to set up the finances to be able to fully support the Movement's future vision.

Training People

Pr Chris Carmody's leadership in CRC Training and has seen change and growth, with the new 'Advanced Diploma in Youth Ministry' course attracting a fine group of students who are becoming the next generation of CRC leaders. Plans are underway to develop similar courses in a number of different areas of ministry.

We have ordained 13 new CRC Ministers into our Movement in the last 12 months.

Reproducing Churches

Church plants have occurred in the last 12 months at Hay in NSW and Docker River in the Northern Territory. 12 % of all CRC churches in Australia were planted in the last 5 years, which demonstrates a strong commitment to this area.

We thank Pr David Wright for his many years of leadership in this area, and look forward to fresh impetus as new leadership facilitates on behalf of the Movement.

Shaping Generations – Youth

Pr Tim Lochens and his Australian Youth team are planning both the Youth Leaders Stream for this year's MISSION: POSSIBLE Conference, and the Youth Conference as a part of the 2017 CRC Global Conference in Adelaide.

The 2017 event will be rebadged as WILDHEARTS (from RELOAD) and promises to be both exciting and impacting for the youth of our Movement.

Shaping Generations – Children

Pr Caroline Dennis has spoken at CRC Children's leader's events across Australia, bringing both her enthusiasm and experience to our Children's leaders. She is planning for both the 2016 Children's Leaders Stream at this year's conference and the KIDZ ABLAZE Conference to be held in Adelaide next year.

Caroline leads a great team of committed leaders across Australia.

Christian Education

A number of churches are in the early stages of setting up new CRC Christian schools across our nation.

Conclusion

As National Administrator I continue to support the National Executive team and the Strategic Area leaders by providing administrative support, and by compiling statistics in the form of measurable metrics that the Executive uses as one method of tracking progress towards fulfilment of our goals and strategies. I have also had the additional task this last year of implementing the new CRC Duty of Care compliance process for credentialed ministers, which has been a major undertaking involving processing hundreds of documents and organising 5 training events in 4 states of our nation.

I look forward to continuing to work with leaders across our nation, at the National Executive level, in the States and in local churches, as together we work towards achieving our strategic plans and targets, and as a consequence extend the reach of God's Kingdom throughout Australia and the whole world.

Audit Report

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of CRC CHURCHES INTERNATIONAL AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED, which comprises the Balance Sheet as at 30 June 2016 and the income and Expenses Report for the year then ended.

Committee's responsibility for the financial report

The committee of CRC CHURCHES INTERNATIONAL AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED is responsible for the preparation of the financial report, and has determined that the basis of preparation is appropriate to meet the requirements of the South Australian Act and the needs of the members. We believe that the evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

BASIS FOR QUALIFIED OPINION

Voluntary Revenue

Voluntary Revenue, such as Church Collections, and revenue from other fund raising activities can be a source of fundraising revenue. Our audit procedures with respect to voluntary revenue had to be restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion with regard to voluntary revenue of the CRC CHURCHES INTERNATIONAL AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED.

AUDITOR'S OPINION

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of CRC CHURCHES INTERNATIONAL AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED as at 30 June 2016 and its financial performance for the year then ended and the requirements of the South Australian Act.

Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution

The financial report has been prepared to assist CRC CHURCHES INTERNATIONAL AUSTRALIA INCORPORATED to meet the requirements of the South Australian Act. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.
