Executive Report
NATIONAL CHAIRMAN

It's been a joy and privilege to serve the CRC over the past 16 years as your National Chairman.

I take this leadership role really seriously and before accepting the nomination to serve for another 4 year term, I prayed a lot about it and consulted with some trusted peers. I'm thankful for the wise advice I received and for the Lord's personal confirmation.

I am committing myself to give you my best efforts and will not slowdown in my zeal for what Jesus wants to do through all of us who belong to the CRC in Australia and across the world.

CRC Churches International has evolved organisationally into a stable and secure denominational family of ministers and churches that is centred around a set of defined values and a purposeful vision and mission. The statements in our Charter identify who we are, what we believe and value, how we operate and why we exist.

I have witnessed other newer movements in Australia and across the world that have not made the normal transitions that

are necessary for a healthily growing and accountable family of churches and ministers. Sadly some of them no longer exist and the Kingdom of God is the poorer for it.

The CRC is entering its third generation since it commenced in the 1940s and we are now, by the leading of the Holy Spirit, formally established in quite a few nations and have an ongoing ministry presence in dozens of countries across the world. To Jesus Christ be all the glory for what He has done in us and what He wants to do through us in the coming decades (Ephesians 3:21).

At this 'Effective Leaders/Effective Churches' conference we are launching our next 5 year Strategic Directions (2018-2023). I'm delighted with the contributions by so many of you through our survey that has helped our National Executive team to frame this corporate plan. This now puts wheels onto our vision and turns some great ideas into a practical action plan.

The CRC's catchcry is '**Creating Churches ... Changing Worlds**'. Our big faith goal is to have 500 churches in Australia and a CRC ministry presence in every nation of

our world by 2045 – our centenary. We are presently ministering in over 60 nations and have 121 churches in Australia. This growth target seems monumental but as we break it down into five year periods, we can see that it's more than possible (Ephesians 3:20). For example, to grow from 121 to 151 churches by 2023 we only need to establish 6 new churches a year. If we achieve this, then for our next 5 year plan (2023-2028) we will need to establish 10 churches a year to have 201 churches by this time in 2028. Each church planted brings with it the potential to birth even more churches. Thus what now seems an enormous task becomes achievable as we prioritise and work to achieve the goal.

Fellow pastors and church leadership teams, this requires us to pray with faith (James 5:16-18) and to diligently implement the strategies of this 5 year plan (James 4:17-18).

Some of the team I work closely with have been urging me, (after 40 years of leading the Christian Family Centre), to record my church and leadership journey as a way of encouraging others in their own development. At this conference we are launching the third book of the 'Can Be' series. In 'The Me I Can Be' I write about the power of Jesus' Gospel to transform lives. In 'The Church We Can Be' I unpack what I've learnt about doing church and how Jesus' church, because it stewards the gospel, is the only hope for our world. In 'The Leader I Can Be' I share about the lessons learnt from my personal leadership journey (both the successes and the mistakes) as my heart is to help others do it better than me. All three books reinforce the CRC's enduring values and faith-inspiring

vision that came through our founder Leo Harris and which pulsates in so many of our hearts.

Our vision and values continue to motivate us to be fully aligned with the New Testament pattern for the Christian life and church.

The CRC will progress for generations to come if it does not deviate from being a Biblically-Grounded, Christ-Centred, Holy-Spirit Led, People-Loving, Forward-Moving (in faith and obedience) and Outwardly-Focused (radic not centric in its ministry and mission) Movement. Lord Jesus, help us to never shift from Your vision for Your church (Matthew 22:36-40; Matthew 28:18-20; Acts 2:37-47).

Our International, National and State teams are all dedicated to working together in love and unity as we extend Jesus' influence across our world, and with humility serve the best interests of all of our ministers and churches.

State Report SA / NT / WA

It has been such a privilege to lead our State Council for almost twenty-two years. As shared at the recent State Conference in May this year, I intend this to be my last term as Chair, concluding May 2019. I feel it is important for a new generation of leaders to guide our States toward the future. Amidst the growing secularisation of our culture, we live in a fresh season that is redefining the mission of the church. This creates a wonderful opportunity for our Movement to impact our world afresh for Christ! God has a lot for us to yet achieve together and I look forward to seeing all He will facilitate in the times ahead!

At last year's conference, we endorsed a new team to lead us as a State. Pr Josh Poyzer was appointed as the new Vice-Chairman along with Prs Cass Tompich and David Bland as Executive members. Together they have added an important fresh dimension to the State Executive. Prs Paul Kidney, Fiona Voortman and Kevin Hall have continued with Pr Greg Crome who had been part of the Executive for the last decade, feeling to step down at this last conference. Pr David Washington continues being invaluable as State Secretary.

PASTORS GATHERINGS

In March a fantastic time was shared by twenty or so of pastors in a Spiritual Formation Retreat sensitively and profoundly facilitated by Pr Rob and Jayna Gallger.

The May State Conference speaker Pr Richard Green from Sydney inspired us around the theme 'Together We Can!' - Leadership, Teams, Birthing Churches, Mentoring. It was a wonderful time, hosted at the Portlife Church with some 100 delegates. Richard insightfully examined the results of the survey we did of our pastors in 2017. Particularly prophetic and insightful, he encouraged us to the potential of our Movement into its future. Reflecting a major desire expressed in this survey, the State Conference

gave more time for interaction, including a river cruise, allowing for connections to develop between the Pastors and Leaders present.

REGIONS

In transitioning the Senior Leadership role at Stirling last December, it has enabled me this year to visit once or twice a month in churches around the States. This role of a 'State Minister' is something our State Executive team is now considering as an ongoing initiative for some of our retired pastors to fulfil in future years.

The Adelaide regional fellowships and those in the Northern country area continue to meet and support pastors locally. In WA and NT we have fewer churches, so it was good in my role as State Chairman to be able to visit the WA churches this last August.

STATE MINISTRY DEPARTMENTS

Thanks go to Prs Nathan Bettcher, Sarah Wilson and Kevin Hall respectively for their work coordinating Training, Children and Youth areas of the State. Also to Pr Allan Cleanthous as our State Coach in facilitating the credentialing process together with the credentialing team of Prs David Smythe, Kevin Hall, Jenny Furniss and Fiona Voortman. Some eight people were credentialed at our State Conference earlier this year.

SA CRC FUTURES SCHOLARSHIP/FELLOWSHIP

The 'SA/NT/WA CRC Futures Scholarship/Fellowship' initiative now in place aims to bring encouragement and direction to pastors for support in new ministry directions for their personal development and growth.

Two fellowships were granted last year. Pr Kevin Hodges attended a conference in the USA examining multi-site campuses to assist Hope Central in their growth and approach to future growth and church planting. Pr Nathan Bettcher spoke at and attended a conference at Oxford University in the UK examining contemporary church worship, lyric content and theology, a topic he is currently completing his doctoral dissertation in. State Report VIC / TAS

I seriously love being a part of the CRC and the faith and life that the relationships bring into our local church as well as our broader network of churches.

It has been a privilege and blessing to lead the Victorian and Tasmanian scene with the Executive members throughout the last twelve months.

Although we haven't seen any new churches planted, we have experienced growth in our congregations. There are good reports coming in from both States of God's grace, growth and direction. That's not to say that some of our churches are not experiencing challenges, because some clearly are facing some issues that test resolve and faith.

There have been some encouraging stories of provision of buildings and property. Wattle City Church at Maryborough has a great story of God's favour when faced with the property they were leasing from the Uniting Church being put on the market. They needed a significant six-figure sum to buy it. After prayer and fasting, a miracle took place where someone gave the church the entire amount.

There seems to be a grace on the CRC for Christian Education and in Victoria there are two new schools planned for 2019-2020. God has opened us up to the possibilities that come with churches establishing schools and the discipling and resources that flow through the education of young people.

The training of leaders in the Generation levels has been a focus in the VIC/TAS scene. We appointed a new children's leader in Rachel Prince to work with our National Children's Coordinator Pr Anna Nyhuis in

inspiring, releasing and training leaders. The 'Implant' Training Day is growing every year in the number of people and churches represented. Some of our Youth ministries are seeing significant growth and influence. We will continue to resource these areas of our churches to bring momentum in reaching and discipling young people.

Training of ministry candidates and internships are other areas of growth. The number of students is increasing, particularly in Victoria and we are hopeful that this will translate into church planters and leaders in the future. The only way we can meet the need for church leadership and visionary expansion is through a generation of leaders coming through together with the CRC heart and DNA. This is only achieved when we are able to have significant influence of our ministry candidates in the training stage.

The 'LIFT State Conference' in May was a great success. The Waurin Ponds team did a very good job hosting the event for the first time in recent memory. The speakers were excellent and the atmosphere of worship and the general feel and vibe throughout the conference was inspiring. Our local speakers made very positive inputs into the conference and it was great to hear the testimonies of miracle outcomes and good strategic planning for growth and influence.

The connection between Victoria and Tasmania is developing. We had some of the senior pastors over for the conference. My wife Rose and I will be travelling to Tassie in November to meet with the pastors in their locations and at a Regional Gathering. I hope to see the ties and relationships between our States grow, with healthy interactions that bring encouragement and benefit to both.

I had the privilege of visiting the CRC church in Halifax, England recently. Prs John and Catherine Warren were sown out of the Manningham church under Pr Matt and Anna Wyatt. They have established a great work there with a church and two outreach churches in the area. I'm amazed at what God will do when we are obedient to the call and move with the Spirit's leading. My prayer is that our churches become more active in reaching for new territory in Kingdom expansion.

Missions Report NATIONAL

CRC Missions is continuing to make progress in the nations because of the faith and action of our pastors and churches. Thank you to everyone involved.

International vision – presence in every nation by 2045

The survey of Australian CRC Churches in July 2018 showed that Australian CRC churches are now working in the following numbers of nations.

	2018	2016
Regular visiting (Including Australia and New Zealand)	46	39
Occasionally visiting	15	17

There is clear trend of more countries regularly visited. This is the most realistic figure we have for a presence in a nation. However fewer countries have been identified this year as adopted with no actual visiting.

Hence although the total number of different nations reported has dropped from 69 to 64, the actual level of impact has increased. However as in the local church where pastoral care is important, there must also be a continual focus on evangelism. Hence in our mission's involvement we need to continue our involvement in opening up new nations as well as developing our existing nations.

National Day of Prayer/Fasting and National Missions Day

A new initiative this year was to introduce to our churches in Australia a National Day of Prayer/Fasting (Thursday 26th July) and a National Missions Day (Sunday 29th July). This year the National Missions Day concentrated on Children's Ministry in the nations. Videos relating to this event were available on the Missions website and a booklet was produced which was on the website and sent to pastors.

The response in 2018 was 54% churches involved in the Day of Prayer/Fasting and 35% of the churches involved in the Missions Day.

Some of the CRC churches in other nations also joined this in 2018. It would be awesome if CRC churches around the globe decided to all be involved in the future.

The proposed dates for 2019 are National Day of Prayer/Fasting on 25th July and National Missions Day the following Sunday 28th July. Please get these dates into next year's calendar.

International Leaders Gathering

The International Leaders Gathering after our National Conference each year is providing an excellent avenue for building relationships between all our National Leaders and the Australian pastors who are actively involved in Missions. In 2017 we had pastors from Bolivia, Brazil and Cambodia for the first time. As well as prayer and relationship building we focused on the challenges of communicating across different cultures.

Africa

CRC has primarily been involved in the Pacific and Asia over the last 30 years. There has only been limited involvement in Africa. However this has been increasing recently, particularly in Ghana and East Africa.

The whole continent of Africa has about one seventh of the world population now. It is projected that by 2100 it will have over one third of the world population. Many African countries have about 50% of the population under 15 years of age compared to about 18% in Western countries. Children need to be reached in Africa.

... NATIONAL MISSIONS

Whatever happens in Africa over the next 80 years must inevitably have a major impact on the whole world. CRC is needed in Africa, but there are many challenges to effectively minister in that great continent.

Walhalla, USA

Pr Warwick and Omega Hughes and their family are now settling in well in Walhalla, USA.

We are very appreciative of all the work Pr Mike Groom has done in helping the church in Walhalla, and in facilitating the process of getting the Hughes family to Walhalla. Also the financial support of Adelaide Christian Centre on behalf of the Movement is greatly appreciated.

Colombo Project

The Colombo Project building is now providing an excellent facility for the CRC work in Sri Lanka. We are progressively repaying the loans to SA/NT/WA and VIC/TAS State Councils. Thank you very much to every church which is contributing to this great project. However we still need about \$162,000 above the exiting commitments made through to 2020.

Thank you

Kelly Groom has managed very effectively the CRC Missions finance for the past four years. Due to change in her other commitments Kelly will soon be concluding her role with CRC Missions Finance Department. Kelly has done an outstanding job and has efficiently and effectively served our sponsoring churches as well as our various mission fields. Thank you very much Kelly. A replacement will be announced in the near future.

Mikaela Groom has continued as Editor of Pulse Magazine. Thank you Mikaela for the excellent job you do with Pulse in your ideas and initiative as well as the actual production of Pulse.

Thank you very much also to Irene Webber who gave me Administrative Assistance in the earlier part of the year, and to Hansika George who has assisted me in the later part of the year. Also thank you to the other staff at SECC who have adjusted and assisted me at various times.

Missions Inspirational INTERNATIONAL

'Remember the former things of old; **for I am God**, and there is no other; **I am God**, and there is **none like me**, **declaring** the end from the beginning and **from ancient times things not yet done**, saying, 'My counsel **shall stand**, and **I will** accomplish all my purpose,' (Isaiah 46:9-10 ESV)

GOD HAS STARTED SOMETHING. There is a new season of evangelistic fervor emerging. It's happening! It's already taking place. There is a fresh enthusiasm and passion among people to share the Good News of Jesus Christ wherever I travel around the world. It is happening especially in the hearts of young people teenagers and early 20's. But it is also happening with some older people. It is so refreshing and inspiring to see this keenness being expressed in positive evangelistic action.

It seems that this new wave a passion to evangelise has come out of nowhere, and that there is no clear identifiable event that has caused this new passion to appear, other than it is the direct working of the Spirit of God. It's unplanned, spontaneous and not the result of a strategically planned program. It just happened, and suddenly there it was.

This new enthusiasm to share Christ is rising from the ordinary people. It is obvious this is a "people movement", rising out

from the people. Leaders are obviously encouraged and actively engaged, but it is not leadership led. Rather it is Holy Spirit led.

*'His miracles are **staggering**; his wonders are **surprising**. His kingdom **lasts** and lasts, his sovereign rule goes on **forever**.'*
Daniel 4:3 MSG)

It is also amazing what God is working unseen (humanly speaking) in preparing and creating hunger in the lost to hear and receive the gospel of Jesus Christ. God is at work even when we cannot see it. He is all the time at work in the hearts and lives of people in communities across our globe.

*'O the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! **How unsearchable are his judgments, and his ways past finding out!**'* (Romans 11:33 KJV)

I hear testimonies of the increasing number of people from all walks of life and faiths, whose hearts and minds are hungering and searching for something more of God in their lives. Their conversations are about evangelising and **taking** the Gospel **TO** the people rather than inviting people to **come** to church. What these young people lack in experience and ministry maturity, they make up with their enthusiasm and bold courage. There is a new wave of enthusiasm and passion to tell out the Gospel, to evangelise on a **one-on-one** basis, that is person to person evangelism. The message is being carried to the streets, homes, markets schools, churches, in fact wherever the people are.

There is no distinction or preference to any particular kind of persons these young people are prepared to approach and verbally present the Good News of Jesus Christ and his provision of salvation. It is for all peoples in all places in all generations.

In parts of all nations, both **developed and developing**, there is an increasing awareness and much more discussion about the sowing of the seed of God's Word in the lives of people. More than has been for some time an increasing number of Christ-followers are now focused and centered on **sowing** and **proclaiming** the Gospel. I am convinced that this is God's hour for the church to re-engage with passion and compassion in sowing the Good News of Christ Jesus salvation for all mankind

*'Then he told them many things in parables, saying: "A farmer went out to **sow his seed**. - As he was **scattering** the seed...'* (Matthew 13:3-4a NIV)

'In the morning sow your seed, and at evening withhold not your hand, for you do not know which will prosper, this or that, or whether both alike will be good.' (Ecclesiastes 11:6 ESV)

God has promised to supply SEED for the SOWER, Bread for our food and to MULTIPLY our seed SOWN. There will be a continuous supply of seed, but only if it is sown, and not used for something else. It's conditional on the seed being sown, and not turned into bread to meet our own daily needs.

Additionally we are assured multiplication of seed sown, which is effective and fruitful increase of our ministry efforts.

'Now he who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will also supply and increase your store of seed and will enlarge the harvest of your righteousness. You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God.' (2 Corinthians 9:10-11 NIV)

This new 'groundswell' of rapid spontaneous **evangelistic fervour** amongst God's people is what excites God's heart and ours also, for this is His passion. There is nothing more uplifting and rewarding than to see all kinds of efforts being made to bring the message of salvation to our lost world.

For this reason, Jesus was sent into this world. For this purpose, he set himself to the task of dying on the Cross. This is His **PASSION**, His **HEART** and His **MISSION**.

Love for God's Word will lead to a love for Jesus, which will lead to a love for the things that Jesus loves most, which is the lost!

'So neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God, who makes things grow.' (1 Corinthians 3:7 NIV)

Let us all readily engage in this season of SOWING that I believe God has given us at this time.

Missions Report INTERNATIONAL

It has been my joy and pleasure for the past two and half years to work directly in Missions with the CRC's International Missions Director Pr Barry Silverback. During this time, I have visited a number of different nations where CRC Churches International is involved. One thing that has become very clear to me is God is at work in many different ways through His called and chosen people, many whom are faithfully and sacrificially obeying His call on their lives.

It is very clear that for nations to be reached with the gospel, training men and women for ministry is pivotal and plays a critical role. The importance of training cannot be underestimated. The great commission of "... making disciples of all nations, and teaching them to obey..." will not happened without an ongoing commitment and growing desire to continue this important work of training.

Let me highlight, three new initiatives that are taking place in the way of training;

Myanmar – In partnership with Pr Andrew Ceu the 'Evangelism and Discipleship Training Schools' continue to train people from the interior of Myanmar. In addition to this we will be starting to run one-month schools in the interior remote parts of Myanmar. The strategy is to take these one-month schools out to

those who are unable to attend the three-month training or Pr Andrew's full-time Bible College. The goal is to train people to reach the tribal interior and remote parts of this nation.

India – Training of young people continues at the 'World Missions Faith Training School'. This school has been running for over ten years now, and many of the graduates are serving the Lord in full-time ministry. This year we have also started an additional school, with the focus on training young people for Evangelism to reach the tribal groups of North-east India. The school is located close to the India-Myanmar border. The hope is that these trained graduates will also be able reach out into the nation of Myanmar.

Papua New Guinea – PNG has had a very long history of training and continues to do so effectively. In 2019 Bethel will commence a 'Pre-school Teacher Training Course' focused on training local and international students to become pre-school teachers. The opportunity to impact young children across PNG with pre-schools linked to local churches is huge. There is the same opportunity in many nations in the South Pacific and Asia. Pre-schools are a wonderful opportunity to disciple young children with the Gospel, and these children then have the ability to impact their own families.

To conclude, training is not new for CRC Churches International, it really is at the core of who we are as a Movement and a key expression of what we do internationally. Training is critical for the future of any missions thrust into a nation, and I look forward to continuing to support ministers to spread the Good News of Christ in the years ahead.

STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS REPORT

One of the first projects I was involved in when I came into the National Administrator role in 2013 was the formulation of the Strategic Directions 2013 – 2018 document. Since then a key part of my role has been supporting the National Executive and other key leaders in outworking the strategies encompassed therein. At the end of this five year period, it has been helpful to look at what we have achieved.

Spirit-powered Evangelism

One measure of the effectiveness of evangelism strategies is an increase in the overall number of people in CRC churches across Australia. We give thanks to God that in a time of general decline on church attendance in Australia that the CRC has grown by 1% over the last five years, and now has close to 15,000 people who are a part of the CRC in Australia.

The evangelism team, led by Pr Ian Miller, will continue to encourage and resource churches to better impact their communities with the Gospel message.

Developing Churches

Pr Bill Vasilakis continues to meet annually with the Lead Pastors of 200+ and 400+ churches, with the view to develop leadership skills to grow their churches to the next level. Plans are also in place to have a similar event with Lead Pastors of 100+ churches, and to utilise the State gatherings to leverage support for smaller churches.

There has been an increased awareness and outworking of key governance policies and guidelines in churches over this last five years. It has been great to see nearly 20 of our churches recently join Safety Management Online as a CRC

cohort to help better manage their Duty of Care process for Children and Youth.

Connecting Churches

There has been an increase in connectedness among CRC ministers across the nation. This has been facilitated both by a stronger regional presence, and by the CRC's 'connection-oriented' ministers, such as the 'state ministers' in SA/NT/WA and others like Prs Rob and Liz Bailey who travel around and regularly catch up with ministers in all corners of our great country.

We regularly average around two-thirds of our credentialed CRC ministers in attendance at either our State and/or National gatherings each year, which is excellent and again demonstrates the level of connectedness in our Movement.

Reaching Nations

For more details on our CRC Missions strategies and outcomes, I refer you to the reports prepared by our International Missions Director, Pr Barry Silverback, his assistant Pr Jeremy Steel and our Australian Missions Director, Pr Mike Cronin.

Training People

In the five years of the last Strategic Plan we have ordained 109 new CRC ministers. Churches have reported recently that there are ministers on the credential pathway in over half of our Australian CRC churches. It is great to see our leaders of the future being raised up now!

The CRC College of Ministry, under the leadership of Pr Chris Carmody, continues to expand its offerings and has students undertaking full or part time studies from one in five of our Australian CRC churches.

I'm expecting this will increase markedly as the new church-based Certificate courses are rolled out in the next year or so.

Reproducing Churches

The CRC in Australia has planted 21 new churches in the last 5 years, and added two previously independent churches. With closures, departures and amalgamations this has led to a net increase of 5 churches in that time.

To facilitate this planting process, Pr Phil Cayzer and his Church Planting team will be running Church Planting Training events around National and State conferences. Additionally there will be a focus on church planting as a part of all courses facilitated by CRC Training.

Christian Education

Pr Phil Cayzer is also championing this area. It is great to see an expanding network of CRC schools across our nation.

The Lead Pastors of CRC churches overseeing Christian Schools have met for the first time to look at strategies to both expand the network of schools, and to strengthen the relationship between them. We look to increase the focus on Church-based schools in the next Strategic Plan.

Shaping Generations

Pr Tim Lochens has continued in the National Youth Director role for the whole of this five year period. We have seen a move away from camps to a more conference-focused format for Global Conference events. It

has been great to note an increase of 8% over the last five years of churches with and active ministry to and with teenagers, along with an increase in the number of churches sending leaders to the Youth leaders Stream at the National Conferences.

Pr Anna Nyhuis stepped in to the shoes of Pr Caroline Dennis as National Children's Director 12 months ago, and is about to lead at her first National Conference. As with the youth area, it has been great to notice a 5% increase in the number of churches sending leaders to the Children's Leaders Stream at the National Conference, and a wonderful 13% increase in churches with an active ministry to and with children during the last 5 years.

In the next Strategic Directions is the intent to prioritise the Young Adults area along with Youth and Children as this showed as an area of less strength in the CRC results in the most recent National Church Life Survey.

Conclusion

I continue to enjoy my role in working with leaders across our nation as together we seek to further the cause of God's Kingdom, while at the same time keeping up with the very real and often insistent demands of administration and compliance. Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of CRC Churches International Australia Incorporated (the association), which comprises the assets and liabilities statement as at 30 June 2018, the income and expenditure statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the certification by members of the committee on the annual statements giving a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the association.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial report presents fairly, in all material respects gives a true and fair view of the South Australian Act, the financial position of the association as at 30 June 2018 and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements and the requirements of the South Australian Act.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report section of our report. We are independent of the association in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110: Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance

with the Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist the association to meet the requirements of the South Australian Act. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of the Committee for the Financial Report

The committee is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of the South Australian Act and for such internal control as the committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial report, the committee is responsible for assessing the association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the committee either intends to liquidate the association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes

our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of this financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial report or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the association to cease to continue as a going concern.

- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial report, including the disclosures, and whether the financial report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.


The accounts have not been prepared as a general purpose financial report in accordance with Statements of Accounting Concepts and Accounting Standards.
